## New software version V1.17 released:

A new version has been released. A bug in the sfu-calibration for real-time light curve has been found and solved. But this is only relevant for those who operate a parabolic dish > 5m or an array > 8 antennas. Better defined geometry on start-up for all spectrometer plots. 




Figure 2: Type II burst observed with 7m dish at Bleien observatory, Switzerland




Figure 3: Type III burst observed with 7m dish at Bleien observatory, Switzerland




Figure 3: Nice type II burst with fundamental, 1st harmonic and split band observed in Ooty, IndiaCallisto status report #36Page: 6/7
